The tent floor was cold when I woke up. Since we planned to go for a nature hike, I had to get up.




When I stepped out of the tent, there was a bag of rolls at my feet. "Where did this come from?" I thought.

Some food boxes were open. Some boxes were not open. Some were on the ground. Some did not have food in them.




What kind of animal can open food boxes? What kind of animal pulls boxes down on the ground?
