


Stefan Is a Sculptor

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
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- ▶ Stefan Saal is a sculptor.

Stefan carves wood. A sculptor works hard. The work is not quick.




One day, Stefan was carving big chunks of wood. A girl and her family came by to watch him.

“I like to read books about stars and planets. I like to read books about shapes.”




- “What is this work about?” the girl asked. Stefan grinned.
